A Joast to Exceller

Forty-five years ago, Exceller accomplished what no other horse in history ever has. He beat TWO Triple Crown Winners in a single race (The 1978 Jockey Club Gold Cup.)

Despite his accomplishments, his life ended tragically in a slaughterhouse, sending an international wave of anger and embarrassment about the plight of unwanted racehorses.

This tragic ending of the racing legend inspired a call to action. Upon learning of Exceller's grim fate, a handful of racing fans created The Exceller Fund to help former Thoroughbred racehorses, one horse at a time.

As awareness spread, the network of people and organizations determined to help these horses grew exponentially. Today, TEF provides care and sanctuary for numerous horses nationwide with a focus on "Racing Warriors".

Remember Exceller not for his death, but for his legacy as a catalyst for what we now call "aftercare", an integral part of the racing industry.
